The text is exhaustive and authoritative and is considered the basic source on the subject. This statistical and narrative account was produced by Joseph Barnes, Lincoln's Surgeon General. The volumes are quite thick, each being approximately 1000 pages plus plates. Like most of these scarce sets, there is some bumping, rubbing, mottling, light chipping, and a few weak hinges.
